
Aside from just feeling very good about the show, I couldn't help but notice of a couple areas in need of improvement. (That's my job, right?) The first is that I am not seeing a total sense of visual commitment from every man. Choreography is one issue, but I see it mostly in facial expression or lack there of. Our Presentation Team works very hard but they can only go so far. We are in need of, and working on, a more effective method of evaluation in that area.

The second issue is in the area of chorus size. If we are serious about doing some damage in Salt Lake City we need to be adding about 30 more men to our active roster. I have entrusted a committee to help make this happen but I am sure that your help is needed. One great singer from each of you is all it would take. Time is short!

John Kleiber is the new Vice President for the 10.000 Lakes Division. Doug Miller was there as Director of Contests and Judging. Judd Orff



taught one of the classes. **Ken Slinde** attended the Conventions and Contest class. And six of the current board members attended classes related to their office and/or responsibilities, **Bill Lydecker**, **Don Knecht**, **Loring Harrop**, **Eric Dove**, **Art Van DeWater**, **and Tom Semple**. All-in-all, we were well represented. Ask any of the above about what the classes were like.



A topic that has involved continued discussion by the board is how to increase the number of men on the risers at contests and performances, especially since we are essentially holding our own or slipping slightly in chorus singers. It seems to me that there are two ways to achieve this goal.

First, like most barbershop chapters, we have a number of men who renew their membership each year, but are not active members of the chapter and chorus. Some of these men have been inactive members for a number of years. One possibility is to find out why they are inactive, and see what we can do to attract some of them back to the risers. I suspect that this strategy will be of limited success.

Second, we can work to increase our membership by recruiting new singers. That approach will work only if we all participate. Information collected several times headquarters reveals that most members, perhaps many 80+%. as as their attended first barbershop chapter meeting because they



were invited and brought to the meeting by someone who was already an active member. In reaching my

"Man-of-Note" total, my impression is that I had to ask as many as 10 men to get one to come as a guest, and that the result was 1 new member for each 5-10 guests. Do the math - I may have invited 40+ men to attend for each new member on my list. I don't give up and quit asking because the last 10 have said "No". As a matter of fact, depending on how well I know the prospect, I may not quit asking him because he turned me down the first time. The next one I ask may be the next new member. We do have a challenge in recruiting new members such as the cost, especially considering the trip to international each year, and the quality of our performance, which I suspect many potential members find intimidating. Are you up to the challenge?

### From the Judges Pit

The Great Northern Union is very fortunate to count 9 judges among our members. Through this column, we will get advice from these experts on how to improve our individual performance.

I had a little idle time today and was thinking ahead to Salt Lake City, so I looked at the GNU international contest scores over the past eight years. I thought I would share a few statistical observations and then pose a question to each of us. Since we can't affect the scores of other choruses, I focused on our scores instead of our rank in each contest.



The GNU's highest total scores at international contests correlate pretty well with chorus size. The table below shows the year, the number of men on the risers, and the score average.

Year	Men	Score
2000	86	89.4
1997	88	88.1
2001	85	87.9
1999	84	86.6
2002	65	85.5
2004	62	85.1
1998	69	84.7
2003	68	84.4

So when Mark Hale and Pete lobby for a larger chorus, there is some logic behind that lobbying. It's pretty clear that we score higher when our total singers is in the 80's than when it's in the 60's. But if you look at the choruses that have beaten us recently, there are some notable exceptions to the size correlation. Toronto Northern Lights has consistently outscored the GNU (and

medaled) over the past four years with an average of 47 men. The Alliance has outscored the GNU (and medaled) the past two years with an average of 52 men. So it is not impossible to get international medals with a smaller chorus. With that in mind, I thought it might be interesting to see how many points/man (score average / # of men) we've achieved over this same period. The table below shows the year, number of men on the risers, and the points per man for that contest.

Year	Men	Points/man
2004	62	1.4
2002	65	1.3
2003	68	1.2
1998	69	1.2
2000	86	1.0
2001	85	1.0
1999	84	1.0
1997	88	1.0

What's encouraging to me about this table is that we're getting more points out of fewer men the last three years than ever before. Obviously Scott and now Pete have done some good things with the men we have, and the trend is up.

So what's the point? I would suggest that there are two ways to an international medal:

- 1:Better quality per man
- 2. More quality men

Each of us can take the Toronto approach and raise our individual contribution level. (Toronto averages about 2.0 points per man!) Or we can bring in more quality singers. That's the Ambassadors and Northbrook approach. (The Vocal Majority and Masters of Harmony do both!)

So, ask yourself which camp you're in. Can you realistically raise your performance level from 1.4 (GNU's 2004 international average) to something higher? If enough men do that, we WILL get a medal. Or can you bring in more quality singers to raise our total score? If enough men do that, we WILL get a medal. There's certainly nothing wrong with doing both. But doing neither means your contribution is static. If enough men do that, we WILL NOT get a medal. So just how many points are you worth?:-)

P.S. All of the above logic applies just as well to non-contest activities, too!

#### A SHAKY CHALLENGE

Most of you have no doubt noticed my bouncing right hand. Since 1993 I have known that have - 1 Parkinson's Disease. neurological disorder which produces diminished functioning. With the help of my neurologist and a mix medications. progression of the disease is at a very slow rate, and



that probably will not change. But the presence of some of the symptoms of the Parkinson's has presented me with a significant set of challenges as a participant in GNU.

My performance is challenged by these five symptoms:

- An 'at-rest' tremor. It appears only in my right arm. When my muscles are relaxed, my right hand bounces uncontrollably. As long as I am using the hand in gesture or movement, no problem.
- w A facial mask. All my muscles are stiffened to some extent, and that is most obvious in the face, where I may look disinterested unless I consciously and with considerable effort, put on a face appropriate to the mood of the song we are singing.
- w Less control of moves. There is sometimes a short interval between the time my brain gives a message to my muscles and their response. So getting up and moving about is sometimes slowed. I have to anticipate moves even more than most of you.
- w Dropping the voice at the end of phrases. It requires constant effort to complete each phrase and energize into the next.
- w Deterioration of the voice a tremolo, accompanied with other reduction of quality in sound and volume. It's hard work staying in the model and being sure I have proper support.

The intentional work on facial expression, vocal technique and movement is actually beneficial, even a therapeutic discipline for me. However, because the standard of excellence of the GNU and our ability to be competitive are important to me, I have an understanding with Pete, Roger and Scott that when my participation is more detrimental than helpful, any of the four of us needs to say it's time to sit down.

Meanwhile, singing with the men of this great and talented group continues to be a privilege, a delight, a joy and good medicine for me.


A teacher in the Minneapolis school system for many years, Bea directed choral music in the high school setting.

Congratulations, Bea Hasselmann on your fine work promoting harmony with our youth.










































# **Bound for Glory**
