GNU Quartets do well at International Prelims!





What a contest it was in Wausau on the last weekend of April! The official name of the convention was "2005 Land O' Lakes International Preliminary Quartet and Packerland Division Contests". Twenty-nine quartets prepared well, and competed. It was a fast-paced and exciting weekend for the contestants and the audience alike. All the quartets did a wonderful job. It was so close, that we in the audience thought more quartets might have qualified; but we ended up with two that advanced and will represent the Land O' Lakes district at International this summer in Salt Lake City.

These deserving gentlemen are **QUEST**, (Jay Althof, Mike Laurel, Brent Graham, Tim Milbrandt) pictured above left, with a score of 2830 (average: 78.6) and **AFTER MIDNIGHT** (Tom Matchinsky, David Bailey-Aldrich, Jim Emery, Steve McDonald, with a score of 2753 (average: 76.5). We will be there with bells on, cheering for some of our favorite sons as they compete in the nearly-new and truly wonderful facility on the Mormon campus in SLC.

Also doing an admirable job in this contest were **AARPS-A CHORDS** (Mark Conlon, Gary Jacobson, Robert Griffith, Lance Johnson). They qualified for participation in the fall district Seniors contest. GNU quartet **NOUVEAU** (Jim Olson, Tony Blackwood, Duane Rygg, Dave Boyd) did very well, with a grand total of 2639 points (or 73.3%). **BRAVO** (Marty Monson, Dan Schroeder, Dave Roesler, Mike Faris) was well prepared to go to Wausau; but, regrettably, sickness prevented them from attending.

What am I saying?! I love contest, especially International. It's my favorite barbershop event of the year. Why wouldn't it be? The chorus guys seem to get more focused, some old familiar faces start showing up at rehearsals again, and the singing level is extremely high! So what's my point?



- 12. A number of other ideas just under way or for future (such as longer-range planning using a three-year calendar.)

Roger J. Lewis has been chosen as interim **chief executive officer** of the 30,000-member Barbershop Harmony Society.

Lewis previously served the Society in many volunteer capacities, most recently as international president. He takes over for Don A. Harris while the Society Board of Directors conducts a search for a new CEO. Harris resigned April 20.

He has been a member of the Barbershop Harmony Society for 44 years. He is a competition judge in the Presentation category and has served on the faculty of various Society education programs and coached quartets and choruses. He sings baritone in Antiques Roadshow quartet and lead in Harmony Hounds, a quartet of which he has been a member almost continuously for 40 years. He currently belongs to the Battle Creek, Mich., chapter in the Society's Pioneer District.

Dr. Greg Lyne has resigned his position with the Barbershop Harmony Society, effective Friday, May 6, 2005.

"I consider it a privilege to have worked for the Barbershop Harmony Society for over eight years as the leader of the Music Department," said Lyne in a letter submitted to Society Interim CEO Roger Lewis.

"Dr. Greg is one of my barbershop heroes," said Society President Rob Hopkins. "He is widely recognized as the one of the elite barbershop musicians, chorus directors and coaches. We know his influence will continue to be widely felt, as his musicianship continues to help others raise their level of barbershop performance."

No date has been set for hiring a successor, said Lewis.

"Meanwhile, Joe Liles, has agreed to manage the Society's Music Department as its Interim Director," said Lewis. Currently Music Publications Editor, Liles had previously served as Director Music Education and as Executive Director.

Meet Bill Lydecker!

I joined SPEBSQSA in spring, 1962, and have belonged to 7 chapters, in LOL, Mid-Atlantic, and Northeastern Districts. I have held virtually all chapter offices, been an assistant chorus director, a district officer, and a certified Sound judge. At present I am serving as

the Great Northern Union Chapter President.

I have sung with many quartets, including **Vintage Sound**, 1994 NED Senior Champions. I currently sing with **Magic** (Mankato), a quartet I helped start in 1980. I have been in at least one vocal and/or instrumental music group for all but 3 of the past 50+ years.

I was born in New Jersey, and grew up primarily in northern New Jersey and Philadelphia. I graduated from a St. Paul high I have a BA school. (psychology) from Carleton College, and MS and Ph.D (clinical psychology) from Wisconsin/Madison. I was a staff psychologist at the St. Peter State Hospital from 1961 1965,



professor of psychology at Gustavus Adolphus College from 1965 - 1992, and visiting professor of psychology at the College of the Holy Cross (Worcester, MA) from 1992 - 1995. I have been retired since 1995.

I married Marna Krueger in 1961. We had two sons: Peter (a GNU member) and Karin live in Columbia Heights; Andrew, Brandi, and Amelia June (born 2/24/05, my first grandchild) live in Memphis. Marna died of cancer at age 41 in 1977. In 1981, I married Ann Favor. She had 2 sons: Marty, living in Plainfield, NH, and Rich, who lives in River falls, WI, with his two sons. As most of you know, Ann, who was Chancellor at UW - River Falls, died in an auto accident in March, 2004.

Anything Goes Quartet

Herm Bauer, the tenor, is a retired sales representative of a painting firm in Missoula, MT. He has been singing Barbershop for over 40 years in Montana. He sang in several quartets, most **notable The Deluxe Edition** which made it to international in 1977. Herm also has been a chorus director for over 25 years.

Don Challman, the lead, is a retired school social worker from the St. Paul, MN public school district. He sang with the **Night Howls** comedy quartet for 27 years, performing in 24 states, 4 provinces in Canada, Sweden, and traveled 20,000 miles during the summer of 1971 for the USO entertaining hospitalized military personnel in Japan, Okinawa, The Philippines, Guam and Hawaii.

Norm Wolf, the bass, is a retired school teacher. He sang 31 years with the 1972 LOL district Champion **Roadrunners**. The quartet brought humor throughout the U.S. and Canada and has appeared in lounge shows at the Dunes and Mint hotels in Las Vegas. They also did an HBO special as well as the Grande Opening of Elliot's Feed Store in Deep River, Iowa.

Jack Payne, the baritone, is a retired optometrist from Lewistown, Montana. He is the senior quartet member in terms of age, yet the most junior in terms of barbershop experience (a mere 29 years). He has sung in quartets and choruses in Montana, as well as Sun Lakes, Apache Junction and Mesa Arizona. Besides singing, Jack is the director of the Leisure World Barbershop Chorus and is active in coaching, song writing and arranging.





For those of you forming new quartets and having the wonderful task of picking a quartet name, here are some guidelines set forth by the society.



Approval of quartet names is the responsibility of the Society office. Names are approved under the following guidelines:

- 2.3.1 A name which is already registered cannot be used.
- 2.3.2 A name must be in good taste, containing no offensive innuendos.
- 2.3.3 A name cannot be registered which is phonetically similar to one that is already registered.

(Four Bows, Four Beaus, etc.) or otherwise so similar as to be confusing or misleading.

- 2.3.4 The use of 4, Four, Quartet or other designation or qualification before or after an already assigned name does not constitute a new quartet name.
 - For example, a registered quartet is named The Herdsmen. Another quartet could not register as the Four Herdsmen, the Herdsmen Four or the Herdsman Quartet.
 - Similarly, if a quartet is registered as the Four Tiptoes, a new quartet name could not be The Tiptoes, (dropping a portion), or The Tiptoes Four (changing the order), or The Four Tiptoes Quartet (adding to the name).
 - Adding to, subtracting from or changing a geographical portion of the "essence" of the quartet name does not constitute a new quartet name. For example, if The Herdsmen was a registered name, another quartet could not be registered as the Chicago Herdsmen. If the original name had a geographic connotation,

- such as Sarasota Soundbuster, another quartet could not drop or change that portion of the name and register under Soundbuster, or Seattle Soundbuster, or Southern Soundbusters, etc.
- In instances where conflict seems negligible, the Society office may approve a request.

2.3.5 The protection given is for the use of the name.

A group of four men may not register as a quartet for the sole purpose of tying up a clever name. Also, acceptance of money or other consideration for release of a name for use by another quartet would be a breach of Section 7 of the Code of Ethics.

2.3.6 Reuse of names

A formerly registered name that has not been renewed, except for an international champion or international medalist name, is available to the next quartet requesting that name. One other exception is that the name of a district champion may never be used by another quartet in the same district. In the case of the latter, it is the responsibility of the district secretary to inform the Society office of the duplication. The quartet will then be notified by the Society office to seek a new name.
