GNUs News



Chorus Manager Kent Erlandson does a superb job for us. We would be in dire straits without him or someone like him to carry out a myriad list of often thankless tasks. In fact, the better the job he does, the less we are aware of what he does. It is only when glitches and problems develop that we become aware of many of his duties. A partial list of his duties reads as follows (some of these may be delegated to others, but Kent is still responsible for seeing they are carried out):

Serve as project manager for chorus. 2) Arrange logistical details for rehearsals, performances and competitions - for example, rehearsal times/space, risers, etc., and communicate this information to chorus, including schedule, map, room locations, etc. 3) Plan, coordinate, and delegate details for chapter functions, such as annual banquet. 4) Inspect International hotel, rehearsal, and performance sites. 5) Locate and inspect alternate rehearsal sites (when UMCP is not available.) 6) Handle hotel and ticketing arrangements for contests. 7) Serve as contact person for chorus. 8) Attend Production Team and Board meetings. 9) Coordinate maintenance of risers and trailer. 10) Assist with ordering, maintenance, and distribution of uniforms.

His list of "to-do" items for the On to Fame show includes at least: 1) Confirm date and site, distribute directions, coordinate with school staff. 2) Prepare info for technical rehearsal. 3) Arrange for risers to be delivered and set up. 4) Go to site, walk through, and determine room assignments for performers. 5) Walk routes from room to stage. 6) Purchase supplies and make signs for rooms, hallway directions, etc. 7) Arrive early to post those signs. 8) Get rooms, passageways, restrooms and entrance doors unlocked. 9) Arrange tables, etc, for marketing display, cd sales, ticket sales.

Each event has its own unique list of duties, which he does extremely well. Take a few minutes to thank him for all he does. His job does require many hours each month. You see why it was easy to decide that he should get a medal, even though he was not on stage in SLC.

The Great Northern Union is verv fortunate to count 9 judges among our members. Through this column. we will aet advice from these experts on how to improve our individual performance.

Because there are no evaluations sessions at the International level of competition, Jim Emery talked with some of the judges that were on the Salt Lake City panel asking them for their thoughts on our performance. The following is what he heard.

One Music judge on the Salt Lake City panel, came over to me in the judging area

Saturday night (I was on the practice panel for the finals) and thanked us for "the song of the contest". We didn't have time to really discuss it, but he said we did a wonderfully musical job, especially on the ballad.

A Singing judge on the Salt Lake City panel, also came over and commented on our "wonderful, rich sound", again especially on the ballad. I also didn't have enough time to get any more details from him.

Another Singing judge on the panel, responded to my email inquiry saying the following things (all are direct quotes):

- 1. You guys are singing better and cleaner every time I hear you
- 2. The ballad for me was very artistic and sung with so much rich quality. You guys cranked it up when it needed and then brought it down when the music called for it. Nicely done.
- 3. The uptune was solid right out of the gate.
- 4. Good solid hit and presentation plan and great delivery and lots of lock and ring for me.
- 5. Keep up the good work. It is very evident in your steady improvement year to year at the BIG show.

Another Singing judge on the panel, responded briefly to my e-mail inquiry saying, "Excellent approach to the nuances of the diction; thank you."

One more Singing judge on the panel responded to my e-mail inquiry. A few of his comments are below (again these are direct quotes):

- 1. I really enjoyed your performance. I thought that Young and Foolish was probably the most artistic song sung at the contest. Thank you for that.
- 2. The delivery of the "f" on the word "foolish" was really nice.
- 3. The excitement you generated in this song [uptune] was pretty neat. Thanks.
- 4. Nice overtone on the word "town", near the beginning.
- 5. Again, some really nice stuff. Great excitement and artistry.

Another Singing judge made the following comments: 1. "very artistic singing at the top, internal word swells, classy singing." [on the ballad]

2. "Overall, a solid performance, very listener-friendly, no 'apparent effort' or pervasive problems." [ballad]

3. "I liked what I heard." [uptune]

A Presentation judge, made the following comments: 1. "Absolutely brilliant exposition in the [ballad] intro. Throughout the piece, the constant usage of effective inflection and tone color without drawing attention to the techniques was just terrific."

2. "The beautiful use of hand gesturing [on the ballad] was something others could learn from, for it was not overdone nor repetitive."

3. [uptune] "Very exciting and lots of visual support of the text AND the subtext. The front row movements were highly energized and effective as the song began. Lots of good development in the "choo-choo" move. The bags were a kick! Stomp tempo really handled well."


Another Presentation judge, made the following comments:

I have had the pleasure of singing in 14 International Chorus Contests with the GNU. We medaled 4 times out of the 14 and worked hard every year to medal.

This year the attitude and commitment was better and more focused than many of the other times. We were responsive to all the coach's demands and followed Pete wherever the moment lead him. The way we handled the pre- contest hassles at the LDS Center was truly medal worthy.



In the old days we had an underwear contest before we went on and that helped people relax and laugh a little before hitting the stage. The focus we had in Salt Lake City was as relaxing to me and centering, as any of the methods used in previous years.

In a 3 part series, **Loring Harrop** shows us how we market the **Great Northern Union**. This is part 2 of 3.

"Tickets, getcher Tickets!"

TicketWorks (aka Uptown Tix) is a ticket distributor similar to TicketMaster, but based in the Twin Cities. TicketWorks also has the distinction of offering clients the option of 'subscribing' to their service, meaning we could choose to pay an upfront



fee to have them distribute GNU tickets online and even provide workers to sell at our concerts with no fees charged to our customers.

For the moment, GNU hasn't the cash resources to pay these fees and we've chosen to go with the more traditional approach of making tickets available online where buyers pay Uptown Tix an added fee of \$2.50 per ticket to process their order. GNU offers repeat customers who have subscribed to our e-mail fan list a special discount code: "GNUDIRECT". Users who type this in when ordering receive a discount of \$2 per ticket, which means they only pay an extra \$.50 to order a ticket online and GNU still pays no upfront fees. Ideally,

we'll eventually move to the subscription service, but that requires much higher sales volume before we can afford the investment.

Ticket Works / Uptown Tix (same company, two different services) also provides online sales reporting so our marketing team is able to track sales from day to day.



Why are online sales important? People mostly buy from our members, anyway, right? Consider what happens when a GNU leaves the group, perhaps relocating as Jim Higgins did for many years (we're sure lucky to have him back). Who makes sure to sell to his Minneapolis customers? Hopefully, he placed them on the mailing list so they get reminders before each show. If not, we run occasional ads in community and regional media to spread the word, but we're certain to lose some of them.

In addition, not everyone likes to use mail-order anymore. Many have grown used to the convenience of services like E-Bay and Amazon.com. For these people, GNU now has a service to meet their needs and Jim can tell his customers to either order through him, via mail or online. And getting them online means they see all the great things GNU singers have been up to lately, not to mention what's coming in a month or even a year from now.

This opens our concerts up to broad new audiences. Remember the Norsemen from Luther College? They were able to refer friends and family to our web site to order at their leisure. Between Norsemen and GNU customers, we sold more than 70 tickets online for our March concert. That's \$840 added to the GNU bottom line that we might not have otherwise made.

Last of all, this is a great way to handle the use of credit cards. People are able to order online virtually up to the last minute (the day before the concert, in any case).

Remember, the important thing is that GNU works hard to put on a musical and entertaining concert. Our purpose is to make great music available. Online ticket sales are one more way to make it more convenient for people to attend a GNU event. After that, the fun is pretty much guaranteed.






