

Collegiate Concert begins GNU Concert Season



On March 18th, The Great Northern Union began its 2006 concert season with a joint concert featuring the Metropolitan Boys Choir under the direction of Bea Hasselmann and The Luther College Norsemen directed by Dr. Timothy Peter. The concert was held in the beautiful spacious sanctuary of St Andrew's Church in Mahtomedi, Mn. Our concert series continues on June 24th with our annual On to Fame: Parade of International Competitors Concert. The program will feature choruses and quartets from both the Barbershop Harmony Society and Sweet Adelines International who are headed for international competition. The Great Northern Union was represented by several quartets at the 10,000 Lakes Division contest in Faribault on March




Quartet News

HOBBIES, AMATEURS, AND FUNDRAISING by Lee Roth, VP Membership

Barbershop singers are fond of referring to singing as their "hobby" or referring to themselves as "amateur singers." There are about 800 chapters of barbershop singers in the country. My guess is that about 80 or so of these chapters are populated with men who have a sincere interest in singing as well as they can. They engage in competition, they study, they practice, and they put a lot of time into their barbershop activity. Others like to enjoy barbershop singing, but with various levels of commitment, ranging from some contest participation to social & family performing.

Each of these groups have different goals and funding needs. Some do well on the dues and an annual show for themselves and their friends. Others seek a larger budget that will cover the cost of coaching, learning apes, and support for their educational and improvement programs.

The top ten percent come close to being obsessed with improvement. They regularly screen new singers and have self-recording and audition programs in place to continuously improve the quality of their members' personal singing. Then this top group refers to themselves as engaging in a "hobby," or allow themselves to be called "amateurs," they may do a disservice to their funding opportunities. Grant givers do not fund hobbies nor do they seek to support amateurs. Take a minute to look at the words used.

Amateur

The dictionary says that an amateur is "Somebody who does or takes part in something for pleasure rather than for pay." And, "Somebody who loves or is greatly interested in something." I take pleasure in singing with the chorus and with my quartet. I work hard to improve my singing. I invest a lot of time in the activity. I spend money on obtaining help in my effort to improve. But my dictionary also says that an amateur is "Somebody who has only limited skill in, or knowledge of, an activity." I'm afraid that grant givers latch on to this alternate definition and put all who sing barbershop music into this category and don't consider the ability of the amateur (Tiger Woods was once an amateur golfer).

Hobby

We also have a tendency to refer to our activity as a hobby. As long as the definition in mind is "an activity engaged in for pleasure and relaxation during spare time," then we are probably engaged in a hobby. Many of our hard-working top singers get paid. Are they no longer amateurs? Our chorus and quartets are paid for major public performances to support our cost structure. The better a group sings the more they are considered

to be worth. So are they engaged in a hobby? Are they professionals or amateurs? Perhaps until grant givers and other supporters of the arts understand that we are serious about what we do, we should drop the words "hobby" and "amateur" from our barbershop vocabulary and tell people that we are members of an arts organization. Rather than calling ourselves amateurs and hobbyists, we should refer to ourselves as artists and performers.




Get to know

Steve McDonald

Great Northern Union Chorus front row bass, **Steve McDonald**, has been a member since 1989, when he joined GNU with the help of Bob Dowma. Steve's dad was also a barbershopper at Madison, Wisconsin; and he

also sang with GNU for a time, commuting all those hours for some quality time with us and his son. Earlier, "Dad" was also a member of the Wisconsin quartet, "Woodwins."

Steve says he had a very demanding high school vocal director, who held to a high standard of musical excellence. He says his high school experience was not always easy, but it was definitely worth it! Steve goes so far as to say that we would find our best future members from young men who have with directors worked who demanded much of their students.



Some fine quartets with whom Steve has performed include "Prime Time", with the Halvorson brothers and Bob Albachten; "APEX" with Keith Olson, Jim Larson, and Tom Puent, and now, he is with the current Land O Lakes District Champion quartet, "After Midnight". (This guy keeps some good company!)

Steve cites two specific peak moments with the GNU: One was right after he attended his first rehearsal, and then went to the District convention. "WOW" he exclaimed as GNU took 1st place. Apparently he was hooked from then on. The other real high for him was participating in the big reunion chorus in Fargo.

Steve is mostly an Upper Midwesterner, having lived near Madison, Wisconsin, then in the greater Twin Cities area for most of his adult life. The exception was three years in Atlanta, Georgia. He lives with his long time partner, Brian, in a home they built a few years ago in Prescott, Wisconsin.

Steve is a Pediatrics Intensive Care Registered Nurse at Fairview University Children's Hospital in Minneapolis. He also holds a degree in Genetics and Cell Biology. Now, he is in graduate school to be a Nurse Practitioner,

The meeting was held on April 4 at the home of Eric Dove.

The chapter currently has 118 members; dual memberships are being applied for, according to protocol, in a few cases.

There have been 30 visitors to rehearsal

nights; with 5 new members and 8 potential candidates. It is estimated that about 85 will sing at International.

Plans are underway for the May 21 "retreat activity day". This will take the place of the Duluth retreat.

Additional songs will be built into the repertoire, to be performed perhaps as soon as September.

We are planning on auditions for the 3rd Thursday of each month. Expectations for this plan should be given to a visitor on his first visit.

Plans are underway to have a recording session on the day of the "On To Fame" show. The goal is to make a new recording track, or two, every six months; and a full CD every two years.

The marketing team under the temporary leadership of Marty Monson is planning several events for 2007 and even 2008. These are for April, June, September, and November. A 2007 highlight will be GNU headlining the Madison, Wisconsin, annual show in April. Performance fee and hotel are arranged.

Fund raising from members and sponsors is also ongoing, with a target finish date of the May retreat. Getting these moneys will pave the way for additional grant applications.



Most 'normal' barbershoppers would be thrilled and overjoyed to have accomplished ONE of his above achievements. I know I am!!

Please read his post...and re-read it...and re-read it again. And then BELIEVE IT!! We're no different from that group of guys in Texas, other than they BELIEVE IT! Pete and Scott (and Mark) can do that for us if we heed (think: pay attention and listen) and BELIEVE!

- **Ø** These are Brian's comments as posted on HarmonetLite@yahoogroups.com.
- Ø So, don't tell me that Masters of Harmony and Vocal Majority are full of excellent singers because they're not. They have a few. Every chorus does. But basically, they're full of average singers who are committed to singing excellence as an ensemble and work their butts off to attain it. As the first vocal coach and builder (more or less) of the first VM, with lots of assistance from the Dealer's Choice, I think I can say with some authority that this is correct. We had 12 guys with the vision to make the VM what it became. The first order of business in the audition process was the ability to hear "hawmony," as our Cajun auditioner Charlie White would say. Very close behind that was the willingness to commit to doing anything and everything it took to become what we said we wanted to become. We had, in a nutshell, for the most part, average singers with aboveunderstanding of the basics of average harmony, and WAY-above-average dedication to making it happen. It's still that way.

- Ø I rotated sections every week for two and a half years; the other DC guys took their section each and every week. I had the entire chorus every week for an hour or so, working on vocal skills We had a great time, but we worked very hard. I can't think of a person who I didn't think was giving 100% every single time we met. And, believe me, I knew every wart, every flaw in the various guys, but my job was simply to make them the best they could be.
- We were third at our first International, and most of the guys were disappointed at that. Just shows where their goals were; remember, they were mostly brand-new barbershoppers, so we had to teach them a little about the fraternity part of the game. They just wanted to be the best.
- Ø It was, and is, all about choices, and the willingness and the desire to work at making those choices a reality. It was, and still is, great fun to be part of the VM.
- Ø BTW, people ask me what's our "secret." My answer: Director Jim Clancy (pictured below), peer pressure, and the great character and inner drive of each singer in the Vocal Majority. I wouldn't have it any other way.




