Great Northern Union takes 8th in Indy!



The Great Northern Union came back from International without a medal this July taking 8th place in the chorus contest. On the bright side, it is the 20th consecutive appearance for the GNU in the competition, something no other chorus has done in the history of the Barbershop Harmony Society, and the GNU has always placed in the top 10 internationally. The contest was won by the Vocal Majority from Dallas, Texas who won their 10th gold medal. Other notable performances included the **Westminster Chorus** from California who placed second just 17 points behind Dallas and our other Land O' Lakes district chorus, Greendale's Midwest Vocal Express, got back in the medals taking 5th place with a very creative "fish" set. The **Great Northern Union** (pictured top and middle right) placed 8th in Indianapolis singing a new uptune titled Good Bye Dixie, Good Bye and the very emotional ballad, Young and Foolish. The **Dallas Vocal Majority** (pictured middle left) took home their 10th gold medal under the direction of father/son team Jim and Greg Clancy. Below, **Midwest Vocal Express** captured a 5th place medal and a standing ovation from the audience with their "fishy" costumes. The Great Northern Union is looking forward to competing against MVE again this fall at the District contest in October.











Two LOL quartets qualified for International competition in Indianapolis. They were 1st timers **Voices Only** (pictured top left) from Greendale and 2nd time semifinalists **Quest** (pictured top right) from Hilltop. Voices Only finished 39th and Quest finished one place higher than last year at 19th. Another quartet that GNU can claim as having a member is **Storm Front** (pictured at left) who placed 10th this year. Although they hail from Denver, Colorado, Sid Libsack, the bass of Storm Front, still calls GNU home.

Pictured below are **OC Times** (left) and **Vocal Sectrum** (right). Vocal Spectrum is the new International Quartet Champions and will be on our show in November at Benson Hall at Bethel University. OC Times took 3rd this year and will be on our show in 2007.





"What a great time it was judging the **International** Collegiate Quartet Contest on Saturday morning.

The crowd was large and vocal. Because it was general admission instead of reserved seating, most of the quartet groupies had shown up early and were seated right behind where I was sitting in the judging area. **Ebbets Field**, one of the pre-contest favorites, had all of their girlfriends right in the front row screaming like crazy! On the other side of the aisle, the family members of **New Release**, another of the favorites, was doing the same. It was almost impossible not to get excited.

Then the contest began. Quartet after quartet continued to surprise me, with poise and energy not seen by some of the quartets in the regular contest. And what energy! They certainly took advantage of their youth.

"LOL's **4th Floor** led off the contest singing very well. Five quartets later LOL's **Beyond Cadence**



(who sang on our On To Fame Show) also did a very good job. Eleven of the 21 quartets sang before intermission, ending with the pre-contest favorites Ebbets Field (remember the screaming girls?!). This was the quickest I can ever remember judging eleven quartets. It's because they were all really good.

Then the intermission was over and ten more quartets strutted their stuff. And, if anything, these ten were even better than the first eleven. As it turned out, four of the top five quartets sang after intermission.

Just when I thought I was almost done, the next-to-last quartet came out, a group called **Musical Island Boys**. These guys didn't look like the rest of the quartets, and they weren't. They were all of Maori descent and had traveled all the way from New Zealand for the contest. My first thought was that they'd be fun but probably not that good. Boy, was I wrong. From their first steps onto the stage until they finished and departed again, these four guys just oozed personality. They owned the stage in a way I have seen only very rarely. Each was getting the most out of his individual personality and the four just meshed into an amazing performance. When they were done, it was pretty clear to me that we had our winners.

"But, of course, you never know until the announcements are made. So while the Contest Administrators were tallying up the scores, last year's

college champs, **Men In Black**, came out to perform. They had just come in 17th in the regular quartet semifinals the previous evening and sang very well.

"So then it was time for the announcements. 5th place bronze medalists - Chameleon (yep, they were really good); 4th place bronze medalists - Afternoon Delight (yep, they were, too); 3rd place bronze medalists - Ebbets Field (oo! the girls in the front row were not happy); 2nd place silver medalists - New Release (yep, I had them 1st in Singing); 1st place gold medalists - Musical Island Boys! The crowd really went wild. It felt like everyone in the hall was rooting for them. There couldn't have been a more popular choice. The quartet ran up on stage to a thunderous standing ovation. Everybody hugged everybody. The celebration went on for minutes. What a thrill! Finally, we judges left the arena, and with lots of people smilling at us. What a great way to end a contest!"

The chapters participating this year included the St Paul North Star Chorus, the Minnetonka Clippers, the Faribault Lakelanders, the St Croix Valley Chordsmen, the Bloomington Good Times Chorus, the Minneapolis Commodores and the Great Northern Union. Do you ever wonder what make Barbershop music Barbershop? And what are the judges looking for when listening to a quartet or chorus? Here is the 1st in a series of information from the Contest and Judging Handbook that might help you understand the barbershop style a little bit better.



Definition of the Barbershop Style

Barbershop harmony is a style of unaccompanied vocal music characterized by consonant four-part chords for every melody note in a predominantly homophonic texture. The melody is consistently sung by the lead, with the tenor harmonizing above the melody, the bass singing the lowest harmonizing notes, and the baritone completing the chord. The melody is not sung by the tenor except for an infrequent note or two to avoid awkward voice leading, in tags or codas, or when some appropriate embellishing effect can be created. Occasional brief passages may be sung by fewer than four voice parts.

Barbershop music features songs with understandable lyrics and easily singable melodies, whose tones clearly define a tonal center and imply major and minor chords and barbershop (dominant and secondary dominant)seventh chords that resolve primarily around the circle of fifths, while making frequent use of other resolutions. Barbershop music also features a balanced and symmetrical form, and a standard meter. The basic song and its harmonization are embellished by the arranger to provide appropriate support of the song's theme and to close the song effectively.

Barbershop singers adjust pitches to achieve perfectly tuned chords in just intonation while remaining true to the established tonal center. Artistic singing in the barbershop style exhibits a fullness or expansion of sound, precise intonation, a high degree of vocal skill, and a high level of unity and consistency within the ensemble. Ideally, these elements are natural, unmanufactured, and free from apparent effort.

The presentation of barbershop music uses appropriate musical and visual methods to convey the theme of the


song and provide the audience with an emotionally satisfying and entertaining experience. The musical and visual delivery is from the heart, believable, and sensitive to the song and its arrangement throughout. The most stylistic presentation artistically melds together the musical and visual aspects to create and sustain the illusions suggested by the music.

Speaking of judges, the GNU asked music judge candidate, **Brent Graham** (in purple) and singing judge **Mark Hale** to come and coach us as we prepared for international competition.











Members: Get to know "em

Bob Dowma, a "tenor, and part-time bass", has been a barbershopper for 41 years: twenty of those years with **North Star Chorus** in St. Paul (seven of them as their director), and the rest of the time, with **GNU**. Having sung tenor with the very famous "Happiness Emporium" (International Champion

Quartet of 1975) he had grown accustomed to a good sound, and was delighted to have the opportunity to join Great Northern Union. "There is little I enjoy better than good clean sound, full pronunciation, and perfect balance." One of his most memorable events with GNU was when the 5th place medal was won in San Francisco in 1990. (This is but one of many awards he has earned through the years!)

Bob has a very strong background in music. At Marshall, Minnesota High school, he had 7 years of lessons of each piano and trumpet, and played in the concert band as well as marching band. He also sang in high school; one highlight was when, as a senior, his director made him a tenor in his first barbershop quartet. He loved it! And they won an "A" at the



Minnesota State High School Ensemble Contest in 1960! Then, at Macalester College (majoring in Business Administration, minoring in Math), he taught himself 4-string banjo, and was in a folk ensemble called "The Dewey Decimals and the Librarian". (For good measure, he did play basketball, golf, and baseball.)

Bob and Naomi live in Little Canada. He was a controller at three different companies for his career, and has just retired. He and Naomi raised a daughter Cynthia, also in Little Canada, as well as a son (Dan) who lives in Overland Park, Kansas, with his wife, Noelle. They also have a grandson Evan, in Blaine. As for musical talent of this fine family Bob says, "I can put the musical ability of all of them into a sandwich baggie, and keep the sandwich in there too"... except that we have discovered that Evan can sing."

Within our society, Bob has arranged much of the music for all three of the quartets with whom he has sung: "Happiness Emporium", from 1972 to present, with Bob Spong, Jim Foy, Richard Treptow, and Rick Anderson; "Night Howls", 1965-72, with Doug

Chapman, Don Challman, Dale Teorey, and, at one time, Steve Shannon. They won 2nd place at District on two occasions. He also sang with another fine bunch: **River City School Board**, with John Chouinard, Jim Foy, and Doug Chapman.

But wait, that's not all. Bob sings with the choir at Christ the King in New Brighton, which has produced many religious musicals, directed for some of those years by Bob Spong.

An early and big, big infamous incident which Bob has trouble living down to this day went like this. The "Night Howls" sang at Bob & Naomi's wedding with Doug Chapman substituting for Bob during the ceremony. Bob did sing at the reception and without thinking through the implications, they spontaneously did a song medley which was new to their group: "I Used to Love You But It's All Over", and "Please Don't Talk About Me When I'm Gone". That created a lot of shocked faces in the audience. (And to think Naomi stood by him all these years...! I guess he redeemed himself somehow!)

Currently, Bob is serving as our treasurer. He has also served as a judge for the International Society; as well as chorus section leader, and all around step-in-at-amoment's-notice to lead a sectional or direct a song. Few men have come to our "table" better prepared to serve and function so well in so many roles! We all consider ourselves lucky to know that tall guy in the back row with the big smile, always noticed and appreciated by our audiences.



I had the pleasure of participating in "Sing with the Champs" this year in Indianapolis. I was a bit nervous but the Happiness Emporium gave me a few stage presence hints before we took the stage. The performance went by so fast, I am glad they gave me a video and snapshot of the experience. Many other quartets participated including the Suntones, Acoustix, Gotcha and Realtime. If you have never been to this event, you are missing a great time even if you just watch regular "joes" like me "Sing with the Champs". Steve Anderson



Cantus to join GNU in concert

Cantus (pictured below) is a nine member male classical <u>acapella</u> group based in <u>Minneapolis</u>, MN, USA. The group was founded at <u>St. Olaf College</u> in 1995, and gives 60-80 concerts annually. Gaining recognition as one of America's finest professional male vocal ensembles, Cantus enjoys a vigorous schedule of national tours, subscription concerts in the Twin Cities of Minneapolis and Saint Paul, several innovative residencies and outreach

programs, and recording.

Cantus' repertoire spans many periods and genres, including Gregorian chant, Renaissance motets, contemporary works, art songs, folk music, spirituals, and pop., In addition, much of Cantus' music is composed and arranged by its members.


Cantus' coast-to-coast included tours have performances throughout the United States. In the summer of 2003 Cantus made its European debut at France's Polyfolia Festival. Cantus made its debut with the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra in December 2001 in a program titled "Cantus and Carols," and now appears annually in what has now become a holiday tradition for both Cantus and the SPCO. The ensemble has performed at the American Choral Association's national and regional Directors' conventions and numerous choral festivals. In the summer of 2002 the ensemble sang to great acclaim at the Oregon Bach Festival and at the Sixth World Symposium on Choral Music in Minneapolis.

In accordance with its founding mission statement, Cantus is an active proponent of music education, encouraging people of all ages - especially young men - to sing. Its members are frequent clinicians at festivals, schools and universities throughout the country. Presently, Cantus is the resident artist at St. John's University in Collegeville, MN
