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Recap from the State of the GN-Union Address

Even though I was unable to attend the International Convention (for the first time in 18 years), the 1st weekend in July still gave me that old feeling! I mean the feeling of excitement, drive, and competition! It is a

good time to see where we are as a chorus, and where we want to be by this time next year.

There should be no doubt in anyone's mind that, in Appleton and Anaheim, we need to make an IMPACT! What's it going to take? Working hard? Getting coaching? Being in the zone at contest? Mirror room sessions? Well, we already do all of that. So, it's going to take that and more. It's going to take changing our culture and what



we do in rehearsal even on August 7th. We are going to need to start doing winning performances well before we ever take the stage. We must WIN rehearsals and shows before we can win contests. What we want our audiences and judges to experience must be rehearsed continually.

How do we make an impact? We are committed to 3 specific initiatives that will help us to stand out this contest season.

An Atmosphere of personal Individual attention.

More sectionals/small groups/individual/taping/feedback.

2. Moving more air.

Full breaths, changing our "default" sound.

Body Involvement/Movement
 Letting yourself feel the music and react physically

That's it! Monitor yourself to ensure that you are giving more than your "normal" effort in each of the 3 areas. We are fortunate to be one of the top 10 choruses in the world. Are you satisfied with that? If not, what are YOU going to do about it? When?

Pete Benson Director Great Northern Union Ever wonder what it is that the judges consider as they score a contestant? Straight from the International Convention program, here is what the judges look for in each of the three categories.

Determining relative rank

Music

Judges in this category adjudicate the musical elements in the performance: melody, harmony, range and tessitura, tempo and rhythm and meter, construction and form, and embellishments. They judge the extent to which the musical performance displays the hallmarks of the barbershop style, and the degree to which the musical performance demonstrates an artistic sensitivity to the music's primary theme.

Presentation

These judges evaluate how effectively a performer brings the song to life. They respond to both the visual and vocal aspects of the presentation, to evaluate the interaction of these aspects in creating the image of the song, as well as everything about the performance that contributes to emotional impact upon the audience.

Singing

Judges in this category evaluate the degree to which the performer achieves artistic singing in the barbershop style: the production of vibrant, rich, resonant, technically accurate, and highly skilled sound, created both by the individual singer's use of good vocal techniques, and by the ensemble processes of tuning, balancing, unity of sound and precision. They listen for a sense of precise intonation, a feeling of fullness or expansion of sound, a perception of a high degree of vocal skill, a high level of unity and consistency throughout the performance, and a freedom from apparent effort that allows the full communication of the lyric and song.

Each judge may award up to 100 points per song.

Candidate status. As an official CA candidate, Gary will now begin practice judging live contests as he progresses towards ultimate certification at the 2010 judge category school. Great job, Gary, and welcome to the judging ranks as a candidate!

2008 Choir Loft Fundraising Program

As part of our season concert promotion we are offering local church organizations an opportunity to raise money for their organization through our Choir Loft Fundraising Program.

Here's how it works:

On September 20, 2008 at 7:30pm the Great Northern Union Chorus and the Twin Cities Community Gospel Choir with Robert Robinson will present a joint concert at St. Michaels Lutheran Church in Bloomington, MN. This will be a gospel themed concert with performances by both ensembles which will also include combined collaborations including the two choruses together. The concert event will feature the rich musical history of both gospel and barbershop music and bring them together in a unique musical pairing and event.

Event ticket price is \$22.00. Participating organizations sell as many tickets as they can at face value (\$22). As part of the Choir Loft Program the Great Northern Union will donate \$10.00 per ticket sold back to participating organizations (minimum 10 tickets sold).

For example, if your choir sells 35 tickets to the Sept 20 concert event, you will raise \$350 for your choir. \$770 is turned into the GNU before the concert ($$22 \times 35$). After the concert the GNU cuts a check back to the participating choir for \$350 (\$10x35). The fundraising possibilities are endless!

Ouartet News

On Friday, February 23rd, *After Midnight* and three other local performers took the stage for the first annual fund raiser for the Pilgrim Point scholarship fund.

Pilgrim Point is a camp owned and operated by the United Church of Christ denomination, and located on

a point in Lake Ida, near Alexandria, MN. David was fortunate enough to attend Pilgrim Point with his family for a week in the summer 13 different times, and he and his family still have very strong ties with other families they met over those years. In 2006, David and Angela took Emma and Max to Pilgrim Point for the first time for a week in August.

The idea for the concert came during a discussion near the end of the week between David and Kris Potter, Mayflower Director of Ministries to Children & Families. After brainstorming about what the concert might look like, they decided to have *After Midnight* join with other Mayflower performers, and to direct all of the proceeds from the door donations to the new Pilgrim Point "Campership" fund.

Although the threatening weather (remember the warnings about the 8-12" we were hearing?) kept the crowd relatively small, over 50 people braved the elements, and made for a very energetic audience. Based on their reactions during each of our three sets, and the comments we heard afterwards, we felt like the concert was a real success. A few days after the concert we received the following note of thanks from Kris Potter:

I'm writing to thank you for your wonderful gift of song that you shared with us at Mayflower Friday night. Everyone I have talked with agrees that it was an unforgettable evening of music -- one of those concerts you never forget!

We were able to raise \$500+ for our "Campership" fund, with more coming in each day from those unable to attend.




