Heading to Fargo, District Contest October 25-27

The Great Northern Union is looking forward to the District Contest, the end of October in Fargo, North Dakota. This is a contest that the GNU has won 16 years in a row. However, now we have stiff competition from the Midwest Vocal Express from the Milwaukee area.

We have seen the MVE steadily improving over the last 5 years and they actually tied the GNU at the 2001 district contest. In July, on the International stage, the MVE took 5th place - edging out the GNU by 15 points.

The Great Northern Union has been working very hard with extra and longer rehearsals along with several more performances. Scott Kvigne, our interim director, is working hard with us, and we have had some of the best coaches in the society, like Tony Derosa (singing) and Dwaine Brobst (presentation) work with us on a consistent basis. We have raised our expectations of the membership and they are accepting the challenge.



From the Judges Pit

The Great northern Union is very fortunate to count 9 judges and 2 candidate judges among our members. Through this column, we will get advice from these experts on how to improve our individual performance.

Going to contest;

An Attitude Adjustment:

Don Challman, Society Presentation Judge

The primary purpose of competing should be to have fun!! Entertaining an audience and making yourself a better



performer will help you toward these goals.

Many Barbershoppers view a contest as a win/lose experience - but tt can be a Win/Win experience for all of the contestants If we are honest with ourselves, the connection with Greendale (Midwest Vocal Express) has been a true test of this concept and shows we are on the right track. The feelings of goodwill after Greendale's medal-winning performance in Portland support my meaning. I hope this never changes.

Some people believe that winning is everything (does this thinking pay your rent, give you a salary increase, pay a child,s tuition, earn you a better job, probably not), ..if this is your this mind set, you will end up as a frustrated Barbershopper with no pleasurable memories to cherish.

Not winning doesn't mean that the performers were not doing the best they could. They obviously performed to the best of their ability on that particular night. Consider the fact that it's all performers are responsible for the final result.

"Winning" takes place by the knowledge that you entertained the audience, recognize your contribution to the performance and accept the results. To give up, blame others etc., is unacceptable and labels you a quitter, or even worse, someone with talent who is not willing to put in the effort.

True "winning" comes when you perform to the best of your ability, accept your current stage of development and recognize what you need to do to improve.

The personal benefits of competing as a quartet or chorus member far exceed the momentary glory of finishing first in a contest. To the individual who performs to the best of his ability, goes the inner satisfaction of what he personally accomplished. An empty victory awaits the "leaner" who finished first, but knows he failed to perform to his true potential.

Another factor to be considered is the joy and exhaltation you receive by winning the audience. An experience that far surpasses anything you might get from a trophy. Good comedy quartets can identify with

this: Take the Roadrunners, Night Howls, Ham-N-Rry, Music Makers, and Gay Ninety's quartets..

With the exception of the Roadrunners, none of these quartets ever won a contest but they often left with the admiration of the audience.!!

The VALUE of competition is that it serves to measure your personal (chorus) growth and directs you to the skills needed to advance to the next level. This results in greater personal satisfaction for you, your chorus, and a higher degree of personal connection with the audience.

If you want to make use of your potential, consider that competing with a chorus or quartet can fulfill most of the needs expressed in Maslow's Hierarchy of Human Needs: Joy, self-elteem, belonging, achievement and self-expression.

Finally, take responsibility for your own performance. This more than anything else, leads to improvement!! A willingness to work on the tough spots to the best of one's ability leads to a feeling of accomplishment.

One final thought from The Inner Game of Music: A major key to remember is... "do not allow the inner critic to run your life".

Board Meeting Highlights





Innovation Represents "Barbershop" at The World Choral Symposium

My quartet, Innovation, was honored to be asked to participate in The Sixth World Choral Symposium on Friday and Saturday, August 2-3. The World Choral Symposium is a week-long Triennial (every 3 years) event that includes choral organizations from around the



world. This year, it was held in Minneapolis, MN. This is the first year that this event has been hosted in the US.

To open the Symposium, the organizers had planned a concert of American choral music of all different styles. The performers included Chanticleer, The Boys Choir of Harlem, The Minnesota Chorale, a Native American

singer singing the Lakota Flag Song, a vocal Jazz group and the Excelsior Gospel choir, along with the Minnesota Orchestra. The venue was Orchestra Hall in downtown Minneapolis, which is one of the premier halls in the country (and perhaps the world) for musical acoustics.

Paul Wigley, Director of the Minneapolis Commodores, was asked by the organizer of the event to come up with a barbershop quartet to sing as part of the concert. We were very honored when Paul asked us to participate.

The organizers wanted traditional Barbershop, and they needed three minutes, so we put together a medley of "Wait 'Til the Sun Shines Nellie" and "Sweet and Lovely" from the Polecat book.

What a great experience to be a part of such a wonderful concert. We were honored to represent the Barbershop Society

I served as the Hilltop Chapter's first President when we started way back in the mid 80's.

I'm quite proud to have sung in all 16 consecutive International Contests AND Land O' Lakes District Contests with the Great Northern Union.


I've sung in numerous quartets over the years. Although we never scored very high in any contest, my quartets always were thrilled just to make it as mike testers for the Saturday night show. We had fun; and it was exciting. I highly recommend the experience to everyone!

I'm retired now, but my career spanned over 40 years in the computer industry where I was a programmer and manager. I started programming at Control Data in 1961 and spent nearly 30 years with them moving to locations like Seattle, Los Angeles, San Diego, and Minneapolis.

My work background led me to help the Society start to use computers back in the 80's. I wrote the Society's first computerized contest-scoring system. As a result of that project, I served on about 10 consecutive International Contest panels. During those years, I traveled to the 4 corners of the US to teach Secretary Judges how to use computers and the scoring system.

I'm presently a Contest Administrator judge and travel around the country judging division, district and international contests. Theresa and I just got back from Anchorage where I judged the Evergreen District's Fall Contest.

Next time, I'll talk about some of my ideas for my tenure as President. For now, suffice it to say that your board is being diligent. They have written individual work plans, and have given myself and



their peers updates as to how they have already progressed. Many of these tasks require long term dedication, all in the name of helping the chapter achieve loftier goals.
