Is it just me, or does this chorus really seem to be moving forward lightning speed? enthusiasm toward disciplined rehearsals, learning new music, and embracing change has been fantastic and I thank you for that. In the past couple of months, we have learned five new songs, and have already had our first coaching session on Montreal uptune!



OK, enough patting ourselves on the back. massive action tells me that we are capable of doing more than we ever thought possible. This is good news, but we really have only scratched the surface of excellence. How do we ensure that we will keep moving forward? Expect more - more from yourselves - more from your peers.

In a recent email to the music team, I mentioned three major areas of improvement I would like to target for the GNU in the ensuing months. They are as follows:

- 1. Uncompromising, "on the breath," Paul Bunyanlike singing.
- 2. Attention to word sounds (diphthongs, singable consonants, de-emphasized neutral vowels)
- 3. Building a bigger bass section.

The first two areas are fundamentals and really should be second nature to a chorus of this caliber. We will get there through awareness,

repetition and training ourselves to accept nothing but the best sound. The third item something that each of us can also work on.



Think of all the great bass singers who are missing out on

the GNU experience and give them a call!



In the last issue, I promised you some words about my ideas for making the chapter achieve new heights.

Two key concepts for our success as a chapter are organization and strategic, longrange planning.



of objects, ideas, people, etc. into smaller groups and then setting directions and goals for each group. And it is iterative; if the first level groups are still too large or too diverse then organize them into a second level of smaller groups. This process provides a way to focus; to accomplish what is deemed important; perhaps to accomplish even that which seems impossible.

Strategic long-range thinking is the backbone of guiding the organization to achieve its long term goals and objectives. It involves the ability to think long term; to see goals and objectives that may not be achievable for 3 to 5 years; and to see the major steps needed to achieve those long-term directions.

Organizing the Hilltop Chapter Board of Directors is a daunting task. However, I've asked each Board member to put together a list of committees to help him with his responsibilities. Then within each of those committees, the Board members are selecting chapter members to help on that committee. Finally, each committee will elect/appoint a committee chair. And soon we're going to see the first meeting of these committees.

Examples of what we have accomplished so far include the 12-Month Planner, the GNU Picture Roster, the electronically distributed GNU's NEWS, the weekly emails of rehearsal schedules and GNU's Notes.

Long range, strategic planning requires something to be written down. Because it is long range, it's easy to forget especially when we get wrapped up solving dayto-day operational problems. So each Board member has developed his own personal plan. Those plans have been compiled into a book titled, "Hilltop Chapter (Great Northern Union) FY 2003 Annual Plan". Each person's plan includes following sections: the Responsibilities. Strengths, Weaknesses, Committees/Possible Members, Milestones, & Budget. The book is now at revision 7. Our next task is to develop a tracking chart for monitoring progress. If anyone would like to review these plans, let me know.

A lot of other work will go into making the next 9 months a success.

Emotions: Let them take over

!st, Let me say that it is a musical thrill to be singing with the GNU and I am honored to be part of it.

As most of you already know, I am a presentation judge and have been certified for 18 years. You are all fairly educated as to what goes into this category, however, I would like to add some thoughts that might help you understand a bit better.

!st, the presentation judge really gets the best of everything. He gets to enjoy the total performance both vocally and visually. He listens and watches to observe the performers understanding of the song or songs being sung. If the

to observe the performers understanding of the song or songs being sung. If the performer is "singing" well, it certainly adds to the enjoyment of the audience. If the performer has chosen the kind of songs that bring out the best of the group, the audience

of the audience. If the performer has chosen the kind of songs that bring out the best of the group, the audience will certainly recognize and appreciate it. Of course, in this style called "barbershop", it's the obligation of the group to follow the rules of "arrangement".

I have been blessed to be part of great barbershop singing and also perform in several different "instrumental" combinations; big band jazz, small group jazz, old time bands, and many different "Dixieland" groups. I play the reeds; saxes and clarinet. It's amazing how all these different combinations are working toward the same end. I don't care what the group, we are performing with the goal of **ENTERTAINMENT.**

When we sing a ballad like "There goes my heart", how can you not get totally into it? A song like that demands that you wear your heart on your sleeve and let your emotions carry you home. In "Taking a chance on love" there are several demands on your emotions, but the most important is the feeling of the beat, "rhythm". The musical technicians will block it out for those of you with "left brain" thoughts. In the choruse, they talk about emphasizing beats "one and three" or "two and four" but I say let your "right brain" take over. Get into the song, let your whole body feel the drive and enjoy the moment. Above all, make your commitment to the song and make it artistic. Your audience will reward you for your effort.


Guest Coach

Quartets? It seems like I've almost always been in one. I've enjoyed them all, and some of the members






I'm currently the lead in **Live Wire**, 2002 District Novice Champions. It's been a privilege to sing with them all. Thanks guys.

















Help Wanted...
