

Director's Cut

"Nice job!" "Great Show", "The chorus is really improving." "The basses are awesome!" Etc. Etc.

These encouraging comments heard in the lobby after our shows can be music to our ears. We like to hear these kinds of things because it is rewarding to be reinforced for hard work and meeting some of our goals,

and because feels good just to have our egos stroked once in awhile. On the other hand, given the type inclined musically audiences we attract. we are likely to get some critical comments as well. So how do sort through we and make sense of them all? How much weight do we put on certain comments? Who do we believe?



If you're like me, when you hear positive comments, you tend to accept them as fact and assume that they represent the general consensus of the audience. Conversely, when others offer criticism, you may immediately question or discredit their musical knowledge (never out loud, of course). Sometimes, unfortunately, a few criticisms within a sea of praise are the things we may tend to dwell on the most. As the director, I am often bombarded with feedback of all kinds, and learning to sort through it all is an important skill. Here are a couple of things to keep in mind when evaluating feedback.

- 1. Gauge your progress. Make no mistake about it, we have made measurable improvements in certain areas over the past few months, and many of the positive comments I heard related directly to those areas. This is something you should all be proud of! Is it possible, though, to gain ground in some areas while neglecting others areas? Absolutely. Would you be surprised if someone said, "your choreography in 'That's a Plenty' was not together" or "MN Rouser needed more dynamics"? Of course not! Acknowledge that we've made great progress on targeted areas within a short time, but we have plenty more to do. Isn't that exciting?
- 2. Consider the source. This seems obvious, but not always easy to do. Is the critic trying to be helpful or show you how much he knows? Is he

someone whose musical/artistic sense you trust? Sometimes general audience members are much more intuitive than we give them credit for. I have learned that spouses are a great resource for constructive feedback because they are usually honest and are familiar with past performances.

3. View criticisms as opportunities for growth. It is impossible to honestly evaluate your performance when you are a part of it. Audiences get to experience your songs for the first time without any foreknowledge of all of the minute details you've been rehearsing for months. They see the "forest instead of the trees." As long as step 1 & 2 are understood, feedback can be a great tool and help to redirect priorities.

Well it seems that I'm having diarrhea of the word processor so I'll wrap this up. I must say that your efforts toward making this year's show a huge success have been outstanding. It was truly an honor to be called your new director. I look forward to the months ahead and hope that you're ready for the next phase of challenging excitement!!

Presidents Corner

In my first article, I told you a little bit about my barbershopping career and myself. The second article reviewed some of my thoughts on strategy and planning.



This month I'm going to talk about a topic that applies to every aspect of our barbershopping career - preparation.

Preparation, he says! Just what is he talking about? I'd offer that preparation is the single most important item that can help you achieve your own singing goals and objectives.

Let me give some examples:

- Do you prepare for every performance by dressing in the appropriate uniform wearing appropriate stage make-up? Of course you do. But do you do the same level of preparation for each rehearsal each Thursday night?
- Do you review the evening's published plan and organize your music for that plan?
- Do you mark your music with areas that need special help or special personal reminders?
- Do you organize your recording equipment and know what you're going to record?
- Do you carefully review each evening's performance the next day and make notes on areas needing attention?
- Do you have your badge in a place so that you have it every Thursday evening?
- Do you practice singing your music with learning tapes and your own recorded tapes? Etcetera, etcetera, etcetera.

Same sort of questions can be asked about the chorus chapter business. Asking those types of questions and answering them is the job of your Board of Directors. In fact, they meet quarterly to address these types of planning and preparation questions.

In conclusion, prepare, prepare, and prepare! Apply this simple idea and I'll guarantee you'll **enjoy** everything about this wonderful hobby even more than you do now.

Remember, prepare.

Treasurer's Report

The new board has established detailed budgets for the current fiscal year (August through July). We have converted our banking and financial management onto Quicken. And, thanks to **Erik Dove**, we are in the process of establishing a new banking arrangement with US Bank.

So just how are we doing financially? Good question - and the answer is "pretty well". We currently maintain a savings account of a little over \$5,000. We did not have to dip into that at the end of the year, as ticket sale revenues began coming in to keep us above zero in checking.

Our revenue to date is almost \$60,000 while our expenses are just over \$50,000. (for a more detailed breakdown of those numbers, contact me directly) so we're fiscally sound. If you combine the ticket and ad sales from our annual show, you will see that this single event accounts for 48% of our total income for the year! That is how important that event is to us. The Show of Champions in June contributes another 10% of our income.

Although we are managing our budget well, there are still many things we would like to do but cannot afford. These include capital expenses such as risers with

guardrails, CD duplication equipment, uniforms, and equipment. video Thev include operating also expenses such as music, coaching, and contributing towards costs of events like our annual boot camp Duluth. competition travel-related expenses, charitable and contributions to Make-A-Wish Foundation, Harmony Foundation, etc.



I also want to note two

more specific items. First, **Mike DeMay**, with the help of several others, has already sold over \$3,000 worth of tapes and CD's in the current fiscal year. Last year, with no new CD to offer, he accounted for over 7% of our



income. While his raw numbers should be way up this year, we also hope to increase our overall income through grants and gifts.

That is point # 2. This year, the board established a new board position, Vice-President of Fund Development. Harvey Berwin is filling

that role and chairing the various teams related to fundraising. So far, Harvey has reigned in \$9000 in grants, \$8000 of which is committed to new risers and rails. You have already seen hints of the aggressive coaching schedule and new music we are learning. Both of which will be significantly higher this year from the expense perspective. Finally, the costs of producing a new CD are very high, especially the ASCAP and royalty fees.

Conclusion: We are doing fine, but we could be doing a lot more. If you really want to make a great impact on the future of the GNU, sign up to help on one of the marketing teams (see or contact **Steve Aldrich**) or fundraising teams (see or contact **Harvey Berwin**).

From the Judges Pit

The Great northern Union is very fortunate to count 9 judges and 2 candidate judges among our members. Through this column, we will get advice from these experts on how to improve our individual performance.

The Singing Category

Jim Emery, Society Singing Judge

Over the next few GNU'S NEWS issues, I'd like to relate what the GNU is doing as it relates to the Singing-judging category.


All the great new stuff Pete is doing with "Paul Bunyan" sound, full word sounds, more legato, singing on the air, touchand-press, and more effective and frequent soft singing are having wonderfully positive impacts on what gets



judged in the Singing category. But before we can understand just how, it's probably a good idea to describe just what gets judged in Singing. So I'll do that in this short article.

Perhaps the best introduction to the Singing category is taken directly from the introduction to the category in the contest and judging rules. That introduction reads as follows.

"One ingredient that clearly identifies barbershop music is its unique sound. It is the sound of barbershop that allows the transforming of a song into an emotional experience for the performer and audience. The best barbershop singing combines elements of technique and emotion to create an artistic result.



"Barbershop singing shares elements of good singing with other forms of ensemble vocal music. Primarily, the listener expects to hear the pleasing effect of in-tune singing

resonant and that exhibit no signs of difficulties. The listener expects to hear the ensemble as a unit, free from distractions by individual differences of quality or delivery.

"The style of barbershop singing adds a distinctive element to these basics. Enhanced by the choice of harmonies. voicings, and voice relationships characteristic to barbershop, the ensemble sound can achieve a sound that feels greater than the sum of the parts. This reinforced sound has been described as "lock and ring" or the feeling of "expanded sound."

"The "ring" of a barbershop chord will always be the hallmark of the style. Any listener to a barbershop performance expects to be thrilled by the sound of a ringing climax, or awed by the purity and beauty of a soft and elegant expression of a song. Great opera singing is achieved by magnificent vocal technique used to create musical artistry. In the same sense, great barbershop singing demands mastery of vocal and ensemble skills to create the breathtaking effects of barbershop musical artistry.

"The Singing judge evaluates the degree to which the performer achieves artistic singing in the barbershop style. This is accomplished through precise intonation, a high degree of vocal skill, and a high level of unity and consistency within the ensemble. Mastering these elements also creates a feeling of fullness, ring, and expansion of sound throughout the performance. When artistry is present, these elements are natural, unmanufactured, and free from apparent effort, allowing the performer to fully communicate and express the theme of the song."

So, the basics of judging and, consequently, scoring in the Singing category revolve around how well each group does in five major areas: (1) intonation, (2) vocal quality, (3) unity, (4) expansion, and (5) artistry.

In future GNU's NEWS articles, I'll expand on each of these areas and relate how what the GNU is focusing in helps to maximize our effectiveness (and score) in each of them.


Two years ago, I sang in






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












RELATIVE PITCH
