need to do over the next few weeks in order to make it all work. We must all rise to the occasion.

What can you do?

1. Do a run-through of the set daily with choreography.

This is the only sure way to get it into your "muscle memory". It's not a matter of knowing the moves and being able to do them, but rather to be able to fully contribute to the sound of the chorus while be involved in the music and doing the moves. Not an easy task, and not one that will be accomplished in the remaining three rehearsals alone. You MUST work on your own. 2. Be Personally Responsible for Developing Excellence! (PRIDE)

Study and own the dynamic and interpretive plan. Don't wait until the third note of the phrase before you realize that a color change has happened. Encourage one

another and hold each other accountable. We're all in this group because we expect to be held to a higher standard, right?

Duluth Weekend




United Church of Christ, Duluth

From the Judges Pit

The Great northern Union is very fortunate to count 9 judges and 2 candidate judges among our members. Through this column, we will get advice from these experts on how to improve our individual performance.

Hi guys,

The GNU chorus has been making some good strides in our Montreal preparation. Thanks to all of you for the effort you've invested so far and for the extra effort you'll be investing between now and the end of the month. One particular thing that we haven't seen improvement on yet, however, is maintaining key, especially in "That's A Plenty". I have some thoughts and a personal challenge I'd like to give each of us on that subject. First, there are more ways to go flat than there are singers in the GNU, so identifying the causes can often be very difficult. But awareness of flatting at an individual level is the first step to improvement. (Sounds

12-step program, huh?!) It is often the case that an individual singer is simply not aware of his own bad habits and assumes that there must be some other cause for the chorus not holding key. So, how do you tell if you're part of the solution or part of the problem? Try



the following exercise at home. It may be enlightening.

That's A Plenty ----

Play the initial key of the song: Blow a D on your pitch pipe or play a D on your piano or keyboard. (D is the white key between the two black keys.) Sing your part from the beginning to the end. (You can surely sing your own part to the entire song without help by now.) Play the final key of the song: Blow an F on your pitch pipe or play an F on the piano. (F is the white key just to the left of the three black keys.) Were you in this key when you ended? If so, congratulations!

If not, then you know you're at least part of the problem. If you didn't end up in the right key, the next step is to find out where you are losing pitch. The easiest way to do that is to do the above exercise with each section of the song. As a guide, you can take the following keys as reference points for the indicated measures. These aren't necessarily your notes. They are the keys your notes should fit into. Start at one point and sing to the next point and see if you're still on key when you get

there. If not, then the section you just sang needs personal attention to maintaining key.

Intro ("Once you really start...") - D Chorus, Measure 1 ("That's a plenty...") - D Chorus, Measure 17 ("It takes you down...") - C Chorus, Measure 33 ("You're gonna get mellow...") - Bb Chorus, Measure 49 ("Once you start you're...") - D Chorus, Measure 65 ("You're gonna blow that horn...") - D Chorus, Measure 77 ("Listen to the tenor...") - C Chorus, Measure 89 ("joint gets a jumpin'...") - Bb Stomp, Measure 105 ("Once you really start...") - F Tag, Measure 111 (bass solo) - F End, Measure 118 - F 7.

For example, blow a D and sing the intro up through the first measure of the chorus. Blow another D (see above). Are you still in key? If not, go back and sing the intro again until you can end up still in D when you get to the chorus. Do this for each section. When you can sing every section and maintain key properly, go back and try a couple sections at a time. Or, if you're really confident, sing the whole song top to bottom again and see how you do. 8. If you had problems making it through the whole song without losing the key, practice this at home every day until you can do it consistently.

If you'd like to try this same exercise on "All Alone", it's considerably easier. The entire song is in F. Blow F on your pitch pipe or play it on your piano or keyboard. Start anywhere and stop anywhere. Are you still in the key of F? If so, good job. If not, go back and find where you're losing pitch. If you can sing the whole song top to bottom and stay in F, you're part of the solution! Thanks for the effort, guys! If each one of us can sing both songs without flatting, it's a slam dunk that the chorus as a whole can do it, too. If you have trouble with the above process, feel free to corner me at any rehearsal. I'll be glad to help you any way I can.

We moved to Fredrick, MD after coming back from overseas, and I joined the **Catoctone Chorus**. We were the MAD Small Chorus Champs, and sang at the Buckeye Invitational. My company has had me on the road for the past year and a half. I just left Southern California, where I am an inactive member of the **Masters of Harmony** in Santa Fe Springs, CA. Unfortunately, I did not have the chance to get a medal with them due to my timing.

Now, as an active member of GNU, I will have the chance to sing on the International stage for the first time ever. (There are many barbershoppers who NEVER have the chance to do that.) I also plan to win a medal this year. I am so proud to be a member of this chorus.

I am in a registered quartet in Fredrick, MD (**Deja Blues**) Obviously, I don't get to sing with them very often.

I was advised by a lot of really great guys in California that I should come and get with the Greatest Chorus in the area, and I think that I have made a good move. (Getting used to all this "Leena and Ole" stuff, though, is going to take some getting used to!)

Meet Bob Griffith

My name is **Bob Griffith**, and I sing bari with GNU, and lead with the Commodores. I have lived in Bloomington since I married my wife, Pat, in 1961.

We have three daughters, and two grandchildren.

I worked for 3M Co. for 37 years until my retirement in 1993. My latest position at 3M was senior research and production service specialist.



My musical background has mostly been singing barbershop and in church choirs, although I did play piano in a small dance combo while I was in college.

I have been a barbershopper since early 1964, and have been in GNU almost 4 years.

I started barbershopping in the **Bloomington** chapter and switched to the Minneapolis **Commodores** where I have been a member since 1979. I am currently lead section leader in the Commodores and the **BOTY** recipient in 1992. I have attended Harmony College several times, and have taken advanced courses in musical arranging.

I have been in several quartets most notably "The Hillcresters" (1966-1968), "The Knights of Harmony" (1968-1988), and "Grandma"s Beaus" (1988-2001). I was particularly attracted to GNU in the summer of 1999 when I attended a coaching session with Joe Connelly and discovered the high degree of commitment GNU had towards musical excellence.







Once again "Mirror Sessions" have begun in earnest. Lots of exciting Choreography to be polished




