Hilltop Quartets Sweep the District Contest

The Great Northern Union competed in the fall district contest held in Rochester, MN on October 24th and 25th. The GNU was well represented with 9 quartets and the chorus, 69 strong, competing. Another 4 GNU quartets performed on the Association of District Champions show and Excalibur did a performance on Saturday evening.

The chorus competition was very close with Greendale's Midwest Vocal Express chorus edging out the GNU by 12 points to take the championship for the 2nd year in a row. The GNU chorus sang their hearts out with 2 tear jerker ballads while the MVE did their green army men set from Montreal. Both choruses qualified for the international competition in Louisville, KY in July, 2004.

In the quartet competition, **Nouveau** took top honors and 3 other GNU quartets scored in the top 5. **PRISM** took the District Novice Championship keeping the traveling trophy in the GNU's "house" for another year.



One judge informally but sincerely had told us after the contest that he felt GNU deserved a strong 93. He added that he was crying at such poignant ballads. He said "I found myself thinking 'what a blubbering idiot'; then I looked up and saw everybody else crying too!". Men, we did ourselves proud.

The tone of the evening was that although everyone

would have rather achieved a first place finish, it was enough, for this time in our history, to have achieved the top score in singing and that "this is not the pinnacle." The engine has started



and many higher peaks are ahead. The time is now to prepare a strong set for International. "Lou-a-vulle", bring um on! We are gonna have some fun!

Judges Comments by Roger Meyer

As many of you know, I'm a certified administration judge and have been for nearly 20 years. I wrote the computerized scoring program that the Society uses for all contests to log in the scores and prepare the reports for the audience, contestants, and judges. In that capacity, I've gotten to know many fine men who work for us as judges.

So at contests, I often go up to the judging area to renew those acquaintances and verify that the Contest Administrators have had no trouble with the scoring program.

This past weekend in Rochester was no exception. Saturday afternoon after our chorus had completed meeting with 3 judges in our evaluation sessions, I wandered into the judging area. There, found Tom Woodall, one of the Singing Category judges on the Rochester judging



panel, who I've known for many years. He was busy sorting his score sheets in preparation for meeting with some chorus in round 2 of the evaluations.


When Tom saw me he stopped his work and greeted me warmly. He said our chorus performance was absolutely excellent. He said he gave us a score of 91 and 93 and said he would stand by those numbers with anyone. He said, "That performance was the finest chorus performance since..." and then he paused while he thought about all the chorus performances he's seen over the many years of judging. After a long pause, he continued, "since I saw the winning performance of the Vocal Majority at the International Chorus Contest in 1975." Well! That comment was so interesting, I said, "Can I quote you on that, Tom?" And he said, "You bet."

He went on to say that he wished he had gotten our chorus in the evaluations because he wanted to tell us how good the performance was. Finally, he summarized by saying, when he listened to us, he found himself crying. He thought, "What a blubbering idiot I am!" Then he looked up and saw most of the guys on stage also crying. He went on, "And I'm sure it's hard since you've done it so often. And you re-created feelings drawn from life experiences. What a great performance!"

Thanks, guys, it was indeed a great weekend and an absolutely excellent performance.

Perennial district top ten finisher, Special Alliance

From the Judges Pit

The Great northern Union is very fortunate to count 9 judges and 2 candidate judges among our members. Through this column, we will get advice from these experts on how to improve our individual performance.



This is part of an email sent out after a recent Thursday night rehearsal.

Hi guys,

Thanks for a good rehearsal last night. Thanks, in particular, for getting into the spirit of the lyrics to "When The Midnight Choo-Choo Leaves For Alabam'".

As you noticed, we are introducing this song a little differently than usual. Let me give you some background on why.

The method for introducing the song was pioneered by the great Robert Shaw. Shaw was known not just for being an incredible musician, but one of the best organizers ever, with an amazing attention to detail. The results of that organization and attention to detail were groups that had absolutely flawless execution on every number they performed.

One of the Singing judges at the Rochester performance commented on many synchronization and other minor execution errors in the GNU performance. While we have made great strides with the model, it is not yet uniformly adopted. It was this judge that told me about Robert Shaw's methods.

Shaw would first introduce a new song by introducing the lyrics only, much like we did last night. He felt that comfort with those lyrics was essential before moving on to rhythms, notes, and intonation. He would not move forward until such a comfort level with the lyrics was uniform in his group. After the words were well ingrained into each singer, he would then introduce the rhythms (and tempos) into which those lyrics were to be inserted. The lyrics and rhythms would be rehearsed until they also had reached a comfort level before any notes were added. I believe it is Pete's plan next Thursday to add the "Midnight Choo-Choo" rhythms and tempos to the lyrics we learned this week.

Complete comfort with both lyrics and rhythms was the trigger to move on to introducing the notes on top of those lyrics and rhythms. This is really backwards from what the GNU usually done. Focus on the notes has traditionally been the most important thing from the beginning. But Shaw felt that introducing notes, words,

and rhythms all at once (like we have in the past) led to many execution errors with each that would have to be corrected over the repertoire lifetime of the number. Adding notes to lyrics and rhythms that are already comfortably learned leads to a finished product that is better in all three aspects.

The final piece of Shaw's process was to work intonation, part balance, tone colors, and other interpretive factors. These are the components most likely to change as the song's interpretation solidifies to the final product. Deferring to the genius of Robert Shaw, we will be implementing his method in the learning of "Midnight Choo-Choo". Last night the lyrics. Next Thursday the rhythms. The following week learning tapes with notes. Have no fear. This method is perfectly compatible with "the model". In fact, "the model" will make this method easier to do well.



For Shaw's method to have a chance of success, it is important for each of us to commit to each step 100%. It would be easy just to slack off on learning the words, thinking that we'll catch up on the words while we're learning the rhythms. Or the over-achievers of the group (isn't that everybody?!) could just decide on our own to go learn the whole song, words, rhythms, notes, and everything else on our own schedule. Please don't do Devote the proper rehearsal time outside of Thursday night rehearsals on the phase we're in. We believe the results will be wonderful if we do. anticipate that the Louisville judging panel will have glowing comments on the GNU's flawless execution and correspondingly high scores. So, have you rehearsed the lyrics you got last night? If not, take the sheet out and read them through OUT LOUD right now. Make sure your pronunciation focuses strongly on the Mark Hale model. And turn those diphthongs!

Thanks, guys. See you next week! :-)

Marty Monson has a resume that reaches to the moon! Together with his long time friend and neighbor, Erik Dove, he co-chairs the newly formed Performance Team. You will have no doubt as the suitability of this appointment after you read his biography below.

Marty Monson, tenor, lives with his wife Amy, and little daughter Stefany, in Eagan.. He grew up in Iowa and went to college at Luther in Decorah. He has also lived in Kalamazoo, Michigan

Marty comes from a very musical family. His dad is professor of music and long time barbershopper. The senior Monson sang in a quartet that qualified five times for the International stage. His mom is an avid singer and "cheerleader". His sister Ann has a Master's in vocal performance and has performed around the world. Now she lives in Minneapolis and has her own studio. Some

of you have taken lessons from her. Marty's brother Eric is a professional entertainer. He was the baritone the first of Collegiate Quartet champion, "Water Street Junction". From there he has travelled the world singing and is currently in the "Dockside Porters" quartet preforming Disney Tokyo.

Marty is one of those kids who has never not known barbershopping. He has always attended shows, even as a child. Since the age of 15 he has been an official member, and has been a GNUer since 1991. Additionally he has sung

with the **lowa City Old Capital Chorus** (Central States), the **Mall City Chorus** (Pioneer District); and he has also sung with Mark Slamka, tenor of **PowerPlay**.

He sang under his dad in high school, which at the time was one of the top music programs in the country. They even had a 35 member barbershop chorus in high school! Then, at Luther he sang in the all male freshman chorus; and later under Weston Noble for the other three years. His minor was music, with a major in management. While in Kalamazoo he worked for a music production company, and (wouldn't you know it) his major customer was Disney.

Now, let's look at his quartet history. In high school he was in a quartet called "**School board**". The name came from the "Music Man". This group sang at the invitation of Six Flags in St.Louis for an entire summer during college! That inspired them to compete in Central

States District contest and they got 7th, and also won the Novice award. As it so happened it was the same contest in which "Gas House Gang" won CSD District champion.

Next came "**Top Cats**" in 1993 and "**Marty's Party**" in 1995. Then in 1999, "**Party of Four**". Finally, Dan Schroeder, Dave Roessler, and Mike Faris joined up with Marty in 2001 to form "**Bravo!**", which later became the 2001 LOL District Champions.

Marty is the Vice President of Sales for Glowpoint, Inc., home base is Hillside New Jersey. They provide video conferencing for all markets. (Ed. note: With a product like that I guess the boss can't hardly complain that you live far from New Jersey, right?!)

When asked what attracted him to GNU, he said that his dad mentioned it when he moved to Minneapolis. He remembers singing tags the first night with the Halvorson

brothers and Steve McDonald.


changes daily, it appears we are not going to zero, as we feared.



















Before we go......
