

**PRISM** (Steve Nolte, Cleon Wahlin, Alan Matchinsky, Darren Hoehne) took 3<sup>rd</sup> Place with a district qualifying percentage of 65.1%.

**Special Alliance** (David Wall, Glen Aronson, Doug Miller, Lance Johnson) took 4<sup>th</sup> place just missing the cut for district this year by 1/10<sup>th</sup> of a percent.

The quartets needed 65% score to qualify for district in the fall.

## Comments about our coaching session with Mark Hale:

Last Saturday's session with Mark Hale was really exciting. Not because of the usual exhilaration we get when a visiting coach manages to get us to sing at our highest levels. Not because of the heightened levels of fraternity that these sessions induce. And definitely not

because of the veiled or overt expressions of how good we Quite the are. contrary. It was exciting because straight with us. We are good. Verv Good! That is what he told us. Not Great. Definitely not a threat to the VM, but very good. He also told us that there are things that we do that maybe only one



other chorus can do. These are the things that can help differentiate the GNU and help us reach the levels we seek. Mark was clear on the tactics we must use to get back to the medals.

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The first is the easiest to achieve: Do what Pete is asking of us. He affirmed that his major accomplishment on this trip was to come from California to tell us that Pete knows what he is doing. Duh!

Number two: Put more sparkle in our singing and presentation. I think I understand what he means. We have made major strides in our presentation skills. We have to some degree overcome our midwestern reserve, but I know we can do more. How do we do the same in our vocal presentation is something we need to ask of our music leadership.

Number three: Add 40 more quality voices. A few years ago after a coaching session someone started a chain of e-mails trying to get everybody to commit by saying " I Believe!" Now, after having a refreshing pail of water thrown in my face, this member of a ninth place chorus says: "I WILL"

I WILL do everything in my power to put the GNU back in the medals. I WILL listen intently to all Pete's guidance and internalize it. I WILL maintain discipline on the risers. I WILL work on presentation on any and all run throughs unless told otherwise. I WILL attend any and all workshops that the presentation team offers. I WILL attend any and all workshops that the vocal team offers. I WILL recruit one new member. I WILL work to reactivate two former GNU members. If we all commit to "I WILL", then I Believe it will happen.

I'm quite intrigued by the tag singing "emotional" thread. Cheers! first formed exactly in this manner. We all ended up in the same hospitality room at 2000 ILL District. We stood around and decided that we were going to sing "First Hello". "High or low tag?". "High". Cool. Man, is this going to be loud.

Joe, Opie and I are just waiting to peel paint at the tag, and we start singing "Our song was a song..." in an attitude of biding our time until we got to sing loud at the tag. Meanwhile, Chuck is selling the heck out of "Our SONG was a SONG...". After the first phrase, I stopped the quartet and said, "Excuse me, Sisson, let me have do-overs" (that was the first time I had met



Chuck). Then we sold the living daylights out of the song. And that tag was much better than it would have been if we have simply coasted until we got there. That

moment had a profound effect on my approach to singing from then on. Chuck has taught us if you want to be a champion, it isn't a "sometimes thing". It is an "all-the-time thing" (not his words but his actions). We rapidly learned that he never turns off. As a result, we now "never turn off". I was singing tags last year and after the first tag, a guy turned to me and said, "Kevin, this isn't Cheers!". Well, you know what, I now know no other way to sing/perform. I can't turn off now, and frankly, it's more fun to be "on". To reach musical excellence, you can't spend your time turning on and off and ever get close. You either commit to it, or you don't.

I love singing 'em high and loud just like the next guy. I get plenty of practice at it every week!!!!! But I've learned that it is more fun and you get more ring when you do what all those coaches would coach you to do.

One of our star leads, Erik Dove, is the current Co-Vice President of the prestigious GNU Performance team. He currently lives in Eagan with his wife Tona, 5 year old daughter, Siri, and 3 year old son, Adin. He grew up in Evansville Indiana, went to college in Crawfordsville, Indiana; then attended law school in Bloomington, Indiana. He has been in the Twin City area since 1992.

His parents are living in retirement at Park Rapids, MN. Dad was a professor of vocal music at U of Evansville; mom was a home ec. teacher; sister is a mom and an actress in New York; and is an accomplished cellist, pianist, and Juilliard Graduate!

Erik has been a musician all his life. His aunt loves to tell that he sat at the piano and sang before he could talk. Additionally, he played violin from age through high school; was in concert orchestra in 2nd grade; and all-city orchestra grades 5-11. He also enjoyed all-



city choir; performed in various musicals, including a starring role in "Oliver" in 7th grade, for the high school production. He also has 8 years of piano lessons under his belt; and church choirs as well.

While GNU is his first barbershop chorus, he has dabbled in quarteting: "Highway 52" with Jeff Aldrich, Lorring Harrop, Jim Barloon; then "Nuance" with Jim Emery, J. Vaughn, and J.Althof; and "Hot Zone" with Brad Berget, Jeff Solum, Tom Puent; and "Spur of the Moment" with Jerry Germain, Brad Berget, and Mine DeMay. "It is always fun, but family constraints make serious quarteting a challenge" he says.

Currently a commercial banker with U.S. Bank, Erik is running a division in St Paul, reporting to the Kurt, son of GNU member Darrell Egertson. His work there involves mostly with companies with revenues between \$5-20 million. Previously, Erik was an attorney with Faegre & Benson in Minneapolis, primarily practicing in environmental and commercial litigation.


Mike Dove, Erik's cousin, persuaded Erik to join GNU immediately when he moved to Minneapolis in January




